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About WPMI

The Whitaker Peace & Development Initiative (WPMI) is an international NGO founded in 2012 by Forest Whitaker—artist, activist, UNESCO Special Envoy for Peace and Reconciliation, and UN Sustainable Development Goals Advocate. WPMI’s mission is to promote peace, reconciliation, and economic development in areas affected by conflict, violence, and hardship.

WPMI operates through field programs based on four strategic pillars: Conflict Resolution Education (CRE), Business and Entrepreneurship, Health and Well-being, and Peace Through Sport.

Present in North America (United States, Mexico) and Africa (Uganda, South Africa, South Sudan), WPMI established itself in France in 2022, in Aubervilliers (Seine-Saint-Denis).

This expansion resulted from meetings between Forest Whitaker, Olivier Klein (then Mayor of Clichy-sous-Bois), and Stéphane Troussel (President of the Seine-Saint-Denis Departmental Council), facilitated by BNP Paribas, a WPMI partner. The goal: to create a WPMI branch tailored to the context of Seine-Saint-Denis, offering opportunities to residents of Priority Neighborhoods, people distant from the job market, single-parent families, and women in vulnerable situations.



In Aubervilliers, our activities focus on two of WPMI’s four strategic pillars—Peacebuilding and Livelihood—which we have identified as the most pressing priorities based on the needs and aspirations of the local population. Our programs are structured around three main themes:

- Conflict Resolution Education (CRE)
- Access to Business and Entrepreneurship, notably for women
- Computer literacy

Throughout the year, cohorts of learners participate in our programs at the WPMI France Center, located at 55 Avenue Jean Jaurès, Aubervilliers. These cohorts are recruited in collaboration with our local partners, including the municipality and the departmental council. Additionally, we extend our activities to partner organizations and educational institutions, delivering workshops and training sessions to foster peace and development within the community.

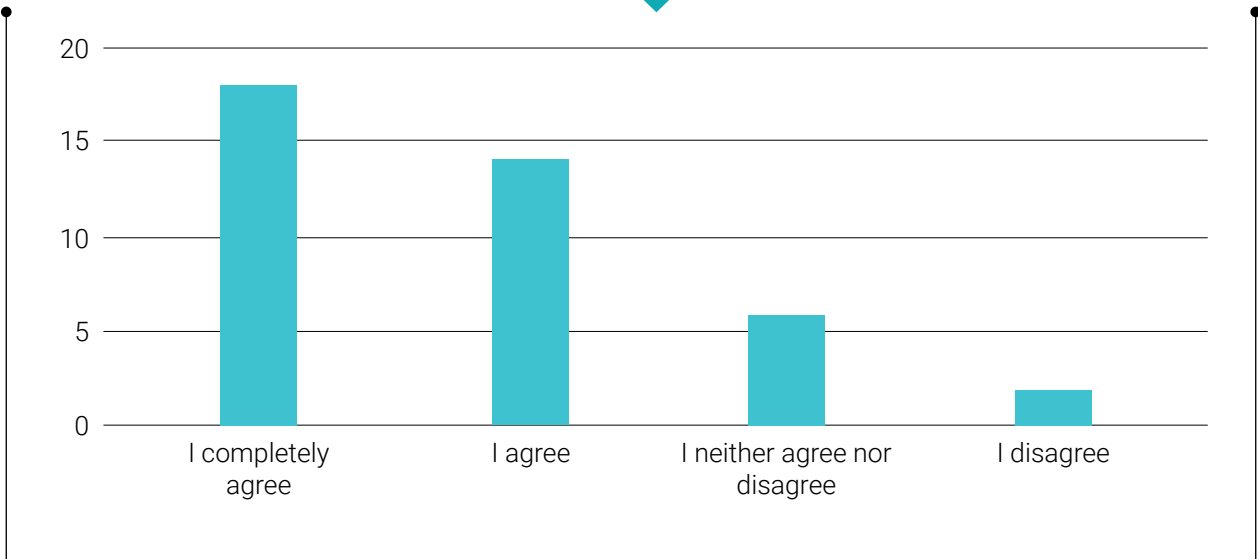


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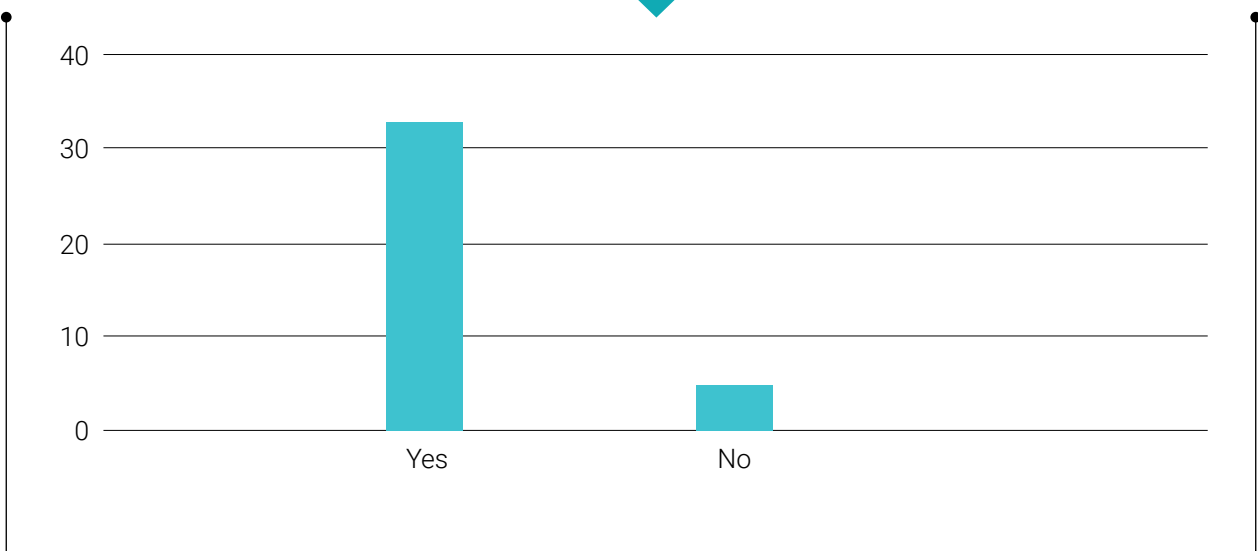

Improving Local Access to Skills, Knowledge and Connectivity

The WPDI training center, inaugurated in 2023, is located at the bustling Quatre Chemins crossroads, between Aubervilliers, Pantin, and Paris. Covering an area of approximately 120 square meters, the premises—generously provided by our partner BNP Paribas and fully renovated—feature a versatile training room, a computer room equipped with about fifteen workstations, a shared reception area, and offices for our team.

Each week, the majority of our activities take place at the center: training sessions in Entrepreneurship, ICT, and CRE, support sessions, individual appointments, and thematic workshops. We also welcome beneficiaries who wish to work independently in a pleasant and quiet environment, whether on a computer or in groups to prepare their pitches or review before final assessments.

Located just above the metro entrances, the WPDI CLC is a reassuring place where visitors and learners feel comfortable. They enjoy coming to learn, work, and develop their personal and professional skills. Many of them express the hope and motivation that

have grown within them thanks to the environment provided by WPDI through the training center and our team of trainers.



Peacebuilding as Grassroots Empowerment

The Peacebuilding pillar lies at the heart of WPDI's identity. Learning to understand others and manage one's emotions, communicate in a non-violent and effective manner, employ active listening and demonstrate empathy, as well as grasp the mechanisms of conflicts to mitigate or resolve them—all constitute a set of essential skills for each individual's personal and professional development.

Conflict Resolution Education

WPDI offers a CRE training program accessible to everyone—whether entrepreneurs, individuals undergoing career changes, job seekers, or simply anyone wishing to develop their emotional intelligence.

The training lasts for a period of three months that includes 12 weekly 2-hour sessions. These sessions, bringing together 12 to 15 participants, take the form of workshops, group discussions, and role-playing games exercises. At the end of the 12 sessions, participants acquire valuable tools to cope with emotional challenges that may arise in

their daily lives, both personally and professionally. They can also apply these skills to support those around them, thereby helping to spread a culture of peace and nonviolence, promote conflict mitigation, and strengthen the empowerment of citizens.



The cohorts are divided into two different groups: the mixed groups open to all, and a group of Women Livelihood trainees—women participating in the entrepreneurship program. In the women livelihood groups, we observe a greater freedom of expression among participants whose life experiences have been shaped by various forms of violence (discrimination, poverty, isolation, etc.). Thanks to the support program, they begin a healing process that allows them to transform their experiences into a driving force for action.

Main themes covered in this course :

- Self-confidence
- Emotions, stress and anxiety
- Identity, values and perception
- Facts and their interpretation
- Active and passive listening
- Relationship to conflicts
- Needs, interests, and position
- Negotiation

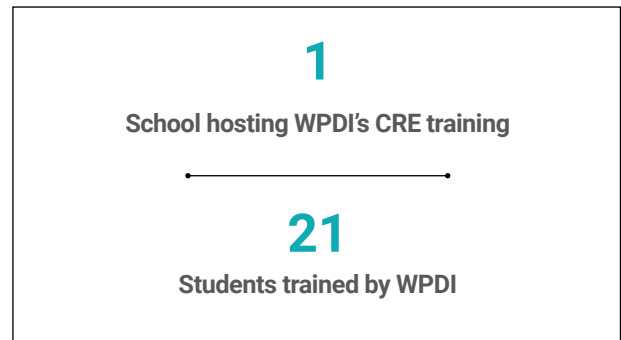

Conflict Resolution in Schools

WPDI operates in more than 300 schools worldwide, with the goal of promoting the values of nonviolence and peaceful conflict resolution from an early age. Learning to manage emotions and understand conflict has a significant impact on a child's or adolescent's development, influencing how they interact with others and respond in daily situations. At the classroom level, we observe a decrease in bullying and verbal or physical violence, as well as improved concentration, which can even lead to better academic performance.

In 2024, WPDI began a partnership with Jean-Pierre Timbaud Vocational High School, located just a few hundred meters from our training center in



Aubervilliers. Discussions with the school principal and two teachers led to the launch of a pilot project with a 10th-grade class.



The program ran for seven sessions spread from April to May. The learning objectives were the following:

- Understand the impact of our actions on others
- Understand the importance of respect, active listening, and self-esteem
- Build self-confidence
- Maintain healthy and respectful relationships with others

Themes covered in each session:

- Self-confidence
- Self-esteem
- Conflict resolution
- Emotion management
- Nonviolent communication
- Concepts of positive peace and negative peace
- Screening of the documentary 'For the Sake of Peace'

Results from the questionnaires indicate a positive impact of the workshops on students, particularly in terms of:

- Understanding the concepts of self-confidence and self-esteem
- Conflict resolution skills
- Emotion management

Students reported having a better understanding of their own emotions and those of others, leading to a noticeable improvement in their interpersonal relationships.

Following the successful results of this pilot program at Jean-Pierre Timbaud High School, WPDI aims to renew the partnership and train new students but also school staff and teachers. WPDI also aims to build on this experience and partner with new schools to expand the impact and spread the values of peace and tolerance.



Accountability Measure

As part of its partnership with the high school, WPDI also implemented an accountability measure for a student who was temporarily excluded from the school. During his three-day exclusion period, the student was welcomed at WPDI, where he had the opportunity to reflect with our team on the causes and consequences of his exclusion. He also interviewed one of our beneficiaries to work on his communication and written reporting skills, and worked on his public speaking and CV.

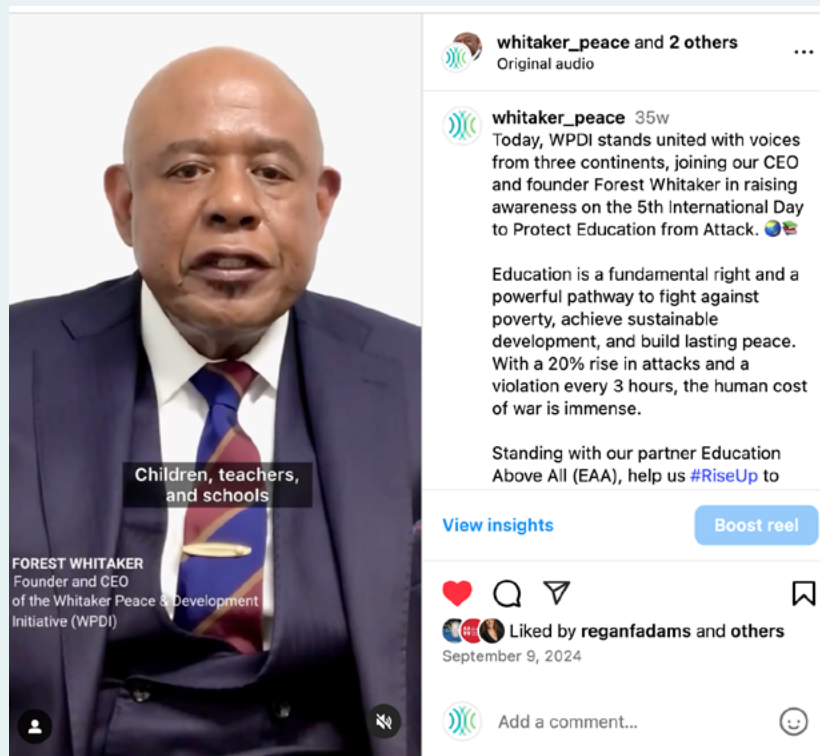

WPDI was mobilized for Children's Rights

Each year, WPDI France participates in advocacy initiatives led by WPDI International, particularly those supporting the rights of children, women, and the most vulnerable populations. In September 2024, the Aubervilliers team participated in a campaign held for the International Day to Protect Education from Attack, aiming to raise awareness about the alarming rise in violence targeting schools and call for global mobilization.

Alongside headquarters, WPDI branches in Africa and North America, and our founder, Forest Whitaker, the French team joined the "Rise up to Unite to Protect" campaign. This collective action resulted in a video showcasing the commitment of all our teams to defend education as a fundamental right. Livelihood: Opportunities for Socio-Economic Empowerment

WPDI's mission is to promote resilience and economic emancipation of people living in fragile contexts, through capacity building, notably in entrepreneurship and ICT.

Business and Entrepreneurship

In 2024, WPDI continued its commitment to entrepreneurship as a powerful driver of economic empowerment and professional development. Through our training and support programs, we have helped participants create and grow entrepreneurial initiatives that promote economic and social inclusion. By equipping them with essential skills in management, strategy, and finance, we enable them to build viable and sustainable ventures.



The Entrepreneurship Program is structured into four phases:

Training

Held at the WPDI training center, the sessions provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of the key components needed to successfully launch a business. Over a three-month period, with weekly four-hour sessions, participants learn the fundamentals of entrepreneurship and develop their own project, regardless of their industry or stage of development.

By the end of the 24 sessions, they are able to conduct market research, develop a financial business plan, and pitch their entrepreneurial project to potential investors. The goal is for each participant to leave the program with a clear, structured vision for their project and the confidence to take it forward.

Business Bootcamp

After completing the training, participants have the opportunity to join the Business Bootcamp: a week-long intensive series of workshops, co-development sessions, and pitch practice exercises offered daily by WPDI.

The Business Plan Competition (BPC)

This prepares participants for the final stage of the Entrepreneurship Program: pitching their project to a panel of experts made up of partners from the private sector (banking, consulting), public institutions (municipality, department), and nonprofit organizations. The pitch lasts 15 minutes: 5 minutes for the presentation, followed by 10 minutes of Q&A.

Ongoing Backstopping Support

The most promising projects, selected by the jury, receive a seed grant and enter a personalized one-year support program. This includes one-on-one coaching sessions, group workshops, networking events, and other community-building opportunities organized by WPDI.

Women's Livelihood Program

As the poorest area in mainland France, Seine-Saint-Denis faces a high unemployment rate, widespread poverty, and a significant proportion of single-parent families, often led by women. In this context, women face specific barriers such as limited access to training, economic opportunities, and professional networks, while also being disproportionately affected by violence and discrimination.

As part of its mission to strengthen economic empowerment and mobilize the potential of disadvantaged groups in Seine-Saint-Denis, WPDI created "Les Battantes", a program specifically dedicated to women. By forming women-only groups, WPDI aims to restore participants' self-confidence, enhance their natural leadership, and promote their empowerment through entrepreneurship.

Open free of charge to all women – regardless of age, professional status, or income level – the program runs for three months. Participants receive comprehensive entrepreneurship training, supplemented by modules in human relations management and digital skills, according to identified needs. While the educational content is similar to that of mixed-gender training programs, it is here tailored to a women-only environment, bringing together women of diverse backgrounds and ages. This format fosters a unique atmosphere of mutual support, shared experience, and collective learning.



With 10 hours of training per week, participants engage in a journey of learning and rediscovery of their creativity, often at a time in their lives when they are distanced from the workforce due to parental leave, unemployment, career changes, family upheavals, or personal challenges. The program allows them to strengthen their skills, regain confidence, and envision a fulfilling professional future in a nurturing and motivating setting.

June 2024's Business Plan Competition

On June 21, 2024, the entrepreneurship trainees and Women Livelihood program beneficiaries from the March–June 2024 cohort pitched their projects before a jury composed of:

- Anne-Marie Etian, Development Officer of the city of Aubervilliers
- Chahrazed Tabti, Entrepreneurship Officer at the Conseil départemental de la Seine-Saint-Denis
- Christopher Tetu, Credit Expert at BNP Paribas

Thirteen projects were pitched, reflecting a wide range of initiatives—from those still in the ideation phase to already registered businesses—in sectors as diverse as wellness, fashion, coaching, and juice production.

On June 27, at the community hub Les Chambres, WPDl held a graduation ceremony and announced the winners of the Business Plan Competition. Seven projects were selected:

The story of Musoya

Aminata Doucouré, 38, is the founder of Musoya, a line of hair-care products including a shampoo, conditioner, and hair mask designed for Afro hair.

Having arrived in France at the age of three, she was never able to find products suited to her hair type and its specific needs. That's what inspired her to create a brand that reflects her identity, with the aim of building a bridge between Africa and French culture, inspired by tradition and modernity. Musoya's raw ingredients are sourced from a women's cooperative in Côte d'Ivoire and then processed in France.

Aminata discovered WPDI's entrepreneurship program online, through social media. Drawn by the presence of Forest Whitaker, whom she sees as an inspiring figure, she also saw it as a sign of fate, as her long-term goal is to bring Musoya to the U.S. market. She has always understood the importance of support for entrepreneurs—she feels more empowered when challenged, surrounded, and advised. After completing the BPC, WPDI's continued support helped her maintain momentum and move her ideas forward.

Her main challenge has been communicating her uniqueness in an increasingly competitive market. Aminata had to stand out, build awareness of her brand, and introduce new ingredients to the market

while learning to balance life as a new mother and an entrepreneur.

The financial grant she won from the Business Plan Competition came at precisely the right time. It literally saved her, allowing her to pay a transporter to deliver her products in time for a major industry trade show. She seized the opportunity and was rewarded with an Innovation Award at the Mondial de la Coiffure (MCB), opening many new doors for her.

Beyond the financial support, Aminata is grateful to WPDI for being attentive and flexible, especially when she had to care for her infant while continuing the program. She came away from the experience with a deep sense of positivity, drawing strength from the community and exchanges, as if she had found a new family. The Business Plan Competition was also a turning point that helped her overcome her doubts and take the leap.

Aminata's efforts have paid off: in 2024, within just five months of operation, Musoya went from zero to €60,000 in revenue, with profit margins of over 60% on the products sold. She continues her journey with WPDI, where her current focus is on securing workspace and new funding to support Musoya's growth, not only in mainland France and the overseas territories, but also internationally.



Information and Communication Technologies (ICT)

Our ICT program aims to address the digital divide, which can isolate individuals who are not proficient in digital tools, making their job search, career transition, or entrepreneurial journey difficult—or even impossible.

The program consists of 24 sessions, held twice a week over a period of three months, at our CLC which has a room with 14 computer workstations. Our trainers adapt to each participant's skill level, whether they have never used a computer before or are more comfortable and looking to expand their knowledge.

The program begins with the basics: discovering the computer and digital vocabulary, using email, and navigating search engines. It continues with training on essential tools for the professional and entrepreneurial world, such as word processing, spreadsheets, presentation software, and online forms. The program concludes with an introduction to social media, ChatGPT, and WordPress.

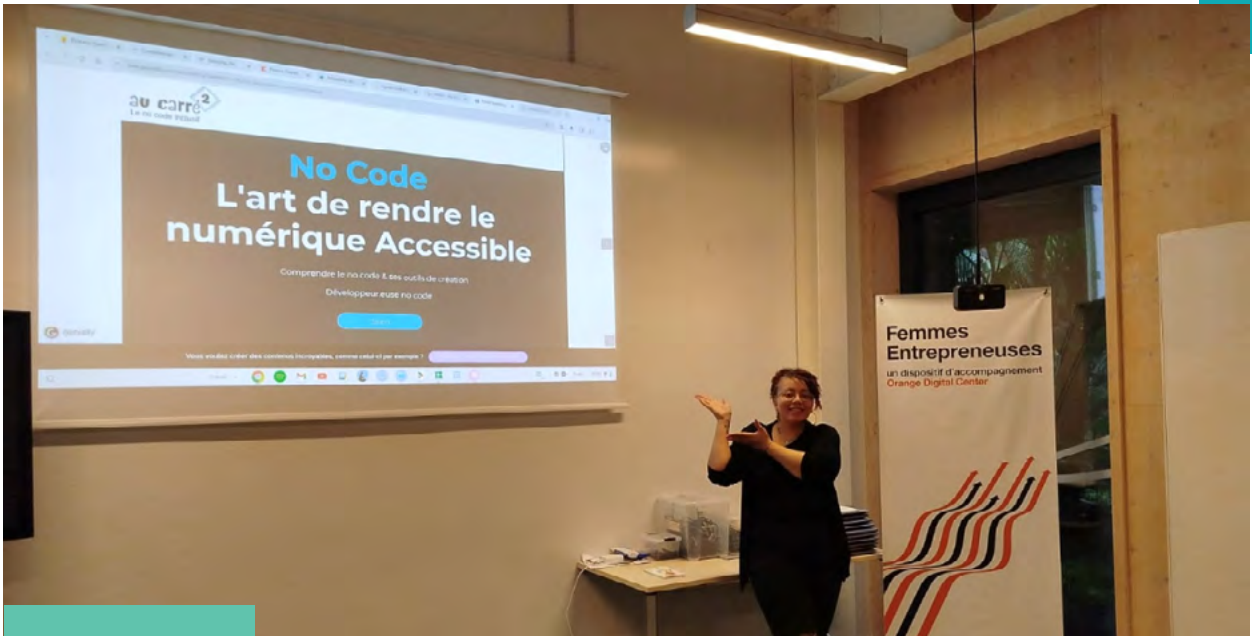
My Connectivity Week (Ma Semaine Numérik)

The Department of Seine-Saint-Denis has reinforced its commitment to the socio-professional integration of its residents who are under the French income support (RSA). An important step in supporting these residents is to improve their connectivity skills. As part of this initiative, WPDI and its partners – Orange Digital Center, Au Carré, 10,000 Coders, and four Local Insertion Agencies (ALI) – have developed *Ma Semaine Numérik*, an innovative program aimed at strengthening the digital skills of RSA recipients and enhancing their employability.

This program aims to remove employment barriers by facilitating access to opportunities in the digital sector, while encouraging further training and professional development for sustainable integration.

The program is a six-day immersive workshop, with 12 participants per session, alternating between the Orange Digital Center and the WPDI CLC. Participants explore digital careers, get introduced to no code, learn how to use their smartphones for job searching, create a project in a fablab, and develop transversal skills such as emotion and conflict management. Practical training on Google tools and ChatGPT, as well as a CV and professional photo workshop, complete the program.

In total, six *Ma Semaine Numérik* sessions will be held during the 2024-2025 school year, supporting 72 RSA recipients. Two sessions have already taken place in October and December 2024, allowing for testing, adjusting, and validating the approach for optimal support of the recipients.

Special Training Modules

In addition to the 3-month training programs, during school holidays, WPDJ offers workshops designed for our current trainees as well as our alumni, local partners, and the general public, allowing for a deeper exploration of specific topics.

These workshops are led by our trainers or partners, such as lawyer Maître Paul Bignebat, accountant Dominique Tita, or professional coach Carole Carrière.

Award and Graduation Ceremony

On Thursday, June 27, WPDI hosted an event to award certificates to the graduating cohort and to announce the winners of the Business Plan Competition held the previous week. The event took place at Les Chambres, a dynamic and welcoming community space near the Aubervilliers City Hall.

We were honored to welcome a distinguished group of guests, including Karine Francllet, Mayor of Aubervilliers; Virginie Galleron, Head of Political Communication and Press Relations at the City Hall; Dalila Benfeda, Project Manager and Advisor for Professional Equality in the Digital Sector for the Seine-Saint-Denis Department; as well as representatives from our partner organizations, Mr. Junaid Yaqub from BNP Paribas and Jean-Pierre Rochette from the consulting firm Devlhon.

Caroline Descombris, Vice President of WPDI France and Executive Director of WPDI International, joined Mayor Karine Francllet in presenting certificates to 60 trainees. They also announced the winners of the Business Plan Competition, honoring six awardees who will receive funding and one-on-one support to help develop their projects (see page 17).

This event was a strong testament to the collective commitment to training and entrepreneurship. It highlighted the talent and determination of the participants while strengthening the collaboration between local stakeholders and our partners. We look forward to continuing this momentum and supporting residents of Seine-Saint-Denis in bringing their ambitions to life.





Conclusion

After the inauguration of the CLC in 2023, 2024 marked the consolidation of WPDI's operations in France. Indeed, the Women's Livelihood Program, the Business Plan Competitions, the incubator workshops, and the implementation of the ICT workshop complemented our existing offering and enabled us to reach a broader audience.

2024 is also the year during which we developed our CRE program in schools, thanks to a pilot carried out in partnership with Jean-Pierre Timbaud High School. In 2025, we aim to expand our reach by working with new schools and more directly with key stakeholders and valued partners such as France Travail and Local Insertion Agencies (ALI). We also plan to expand our ICT course to a broader audience by strengthening our partnerships, responding to a pressing need in the region.
