INTRODUCTION

For South Sudan, 2020 was undoubtedly a year of heightened challenges, as the risks created by the COVID-19 pandemic and a particularly devastating rainy season compounded the insecurity that continues to be a concern in many parts of the nation. While the country was relatively spared from a strictly sanitary perspective, the measures required to counter the pandemic had a drastic impact on the political and economic prospects of the country. In this context, WPDI was forced to scale down its planned activities, notably the vocational trainings we conduct under normal pretenses at our network of eight Community Learning Centers.

Despite these challenges, WPDI could not remain inactive. During the pandemic's early months, it became quickly clear to us that, while populations in major towns were receiving information about the virus, this was not the case for residents of remote areas. Moreover, we were alerted on the fact that misinformation, specifically attributing the spread of the virus to certain groups, was spreading rapidly, and thereby fueling pre-existing tensions within and among various communities. With this the case, we decided to strategically reorient our model to address these unforeseen challenges, with our three cohorts of Youth Peacemakers respectively located in the Equatorias Region's three states in the lead. In an unprecedented effort, we were able to mobilize and equip our youths – more than **600** of them – with the tools and resources they needed to inform local people on the ground about the virus. In total, the reached more than **197,000** people directly. Additionally, they participated in **48** talk shows on local radio stations, which brought COVID-related information to an estimated **140,000** additional people.

After the pandemic's early months, our youths were able to engage in several notable peacebuilding activities as well. They have conducted a number of community dialogues to mediate conflicts or to inform, at the request of WPDI's partner, UNESCO, local communities about the changes that the Revitalized-Agreement on the Resolution of the Conflict in South Sudan (R-ARSS) is expected to bring. We are also satisfied to report that, despite COVID-incurred delays, we were able to recruit 320 young people from across Central Equatoria State to join our grassroots peace force, which will increase our capacity for action in this area for the coming years. We have also been able to continue expanding our roster of businesses in incubation from **13** to **40**, a clear sign of the interest generated by entrepreneurship among the youths of South Sudan. In sum, despite the challenges encountered in 2020, WPDI is pleased to report about the bottomless energy of youth and how it can be tapped even in the most vulnerable locations.

SURVEY RESULTS

85% of our former trainees reported experiencing positive career changes six months after completing a vocational training with us

99% reported that they would or did recommend our courses to others

323 former vocational trainees reported experiencing a positive career outcome after completing the course, including starting a business (17%) finding a job (27%) increasing their income (8%) or pursuing studies (32%)

129 former CRE trainees (88%) reported that their training made them "very confident" in their ability to reconcile conflicts

YOUTHS MOBILIZING TO HELP COMMUNITIES STAY SAFE DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC



In an effort to stem rising COVID-19 infections, in March, the Government of South Sudan put into place measures to stem the spread of the virus, which included the closure of all schools and universities, the suspension of all sporting, religious, political, and cultural events, and limitations on travel. While this impacted WPDI's regular activities, we were quickly able to shift our efforts towards helping vulnerable communities stay safe in the face of the pandemic.

With our **67** Youth Peacemakers and the **539** local youths that they trained in 2019-20 in the lead, WPDI designed and implemented a COVID-19 awareness-raising campaign across the Equatorias Region. As the region is mostly rural and contains many small, hard-to-reach villages that otherwise could not be reached by more traditional means, the campaign focused on door-to-door interactions, the youths participating in radio talk shows to amplify important messages, the distribution of hygienic goods like handwashing stations, soap, facemasks, and hand sanitizer, and reaching people through social media as well as over the phone.

197,036 people across the Equatorias Region have been directly impacted by WPDI's youth-led COVID-19 informational campaign.

Through the door-to-door component of the campaign, the youths have been able to educate people about the virus and preventative measures they can take to help curb the spread of COVID-19. They have taught people how to wash their hands effectively, how to practice safe physical distancing, and how to identify symptoms of the virus. Since March of 2020, they have distributed **3,737** informational factsheets, **3,400** reusable facemasks, **1,110** handwashing stations, and thousands of bars of soap to hundreds of communities. Combined, these activities have directly reached **197,036** people.

The youths have also participated in **48** radio talk shows, webinars, and social media outreach over the past year as well. Across these mediums, they have helped to dispel rumors about the virus and have answered countless questions from listeners. Hundreds of thousands of people have tuned in to listen to the Youth Peacemakers, and with many villages located in remote areas, these activities have had an enormous contribution towards making the campaign a success.

With the COVID-19 pandemic as a backdrop, WPDI made the decision to strategically refocus our cohort of **67** Youth Peacemakers in the Equatorias Region's three states to address the most pressing issue facing their communities in 2020 – the spread of the virus. With their already well-established presence in many local communities, the Youth Peacemakers were able to quickly have a substantial impact, directly reaching hundreds of thousands of people and helping slow the spread of COVID-19 in South Sudan.

They were able to do so, in large part, thanks to the grassroots peace force of young people that they have been training. These local youths – **539** of them in total – have been trained in topics like Conflict Resolution Education and Business & Entrepreneurship, providing them with the tools and skills needed to help them become agents of peace and transformative change in their communities. In addition to gaining new skills, the local youths help amplify the work of our Youth Peacemakers, expanding the impact they have throughout the region.

While under more normal pretenses this grassroots peace force engages in activities including promoting local entrepreneurship, teaching Conflict Resolution Education principles to others, and Community Dialogues, in the past year, they have showed just how impactful well-trained youths can be in promoting positive change in their communities. In the coming year, WPDI will provide them with further training to help them hone their skills – and expand them – even further.



FOSTERING PEACE & MEDIATING CONFLICTS THROUGH COMMUNITY DIALOGUES



WPDI's Community Dialogues program aims to provide communities with a platform to reconcile and mediate existing conflicts as well as discuss topics of prominent concern. These dialogues tend to be led by our Youth Peacemakers, who are then, in turn, able to strengthen their impact and presence within their communities. This further reinforces local ownership and involvement in our programs on the ground and their empowering effect.

Despite the fact that planned Community Dialogues were partially interrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic, in 2020, WPDI's Youth Peacemakers were able to conduct a total of five Community Dialogues, bringing together **214** participants. The dialogues helped resolve a range of preexisting conflicts, including topics such as land disputes, cattle raiding, and gender-based violence.

214 community members participated in five WPDI Youth Peacemakers-led Community Dialogues in 2020.

Conducting Peace Dialogues



As South Sudan's civil conflict only came to an end three years ago now, many South Sudanese citizens have a strong desire to help their communities become more peaceful places. To empower them with the tools they need to do so, WPDI partnered with UNESCO to conduct Peace Dialogues in **seven** of the country's states, including Western Bahr el Ghazal state, Lakes state, Unity state, Jonglei state, Eastern Equatoria state, Central Equatoria state, and Western Equatoria state.

These Peace Dialogues aimed to bring together journalists, military and political leaders, local chiefs, religious figures, women, and youth groups to help them learn how to identify conflicts and their sources, develop active communication skills, and strengthen their conflict resolution and mediation abilities. Over the course of two months, the dialogues were widely successful, bringing together **311** participants.

311 community members participated in Peace Dialogues organized by WPDI with UNESCO in seven of South Sudan's states.

DISSEMINATING INFORMATION & SKILLS THROUGH A NETWORK OF COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS



WPDI believes that, in order to foster long-lasting peace and create an environment conducive to sustainable development, communities must be able to access information and knowledge. Unfortunately, in many developing countries, people tend to lack access to these, as well as educational, vocational, and other opportunities more widely. This often exacerbates socioeconomic and other challenges.

26,746 people utilized WPDI's eight Community Learning Centers in 2020.

Therefore, expanding access to opportunities that help people gain knowledge and skills are foundational to transformative change and at the core of WPDI's mandate. That is the purpose of our network of eight Community Learning Centers, located across South Sudan's Equatorias Region. Each center is in an easily accessible place where people can use Internet-connected computers, a free library, or even take free vocational training courses in topics like Conflict Resolution Education, Information & Communications Technology, Business & Entrepreneurship, and Arts & Crafts.

Under more normal circumstances, our network of Community Learning Centers also hosts public events under other programs, such as Community Dialogues, Peace Through Sports, or Cinema for Peace, among others. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, WPDI had to put in place very strict safety and sanitary measures, which included the closure of many of our centers for substantial portions of last year. Despite that, each of our centers remains a vibrant community hub and had a significant number of visitors in 2020.







As South Sudan has known conflict for almost **40** of the past **60** years, fostering values and attitudes conducive to building long lasting peace is a paramount issue. WPDI's Conflict Resolution Education course aims to do exactly that by empowering trainees with the tools and skills they need to become resilient in the face of conflict as well as active agents for peace in their communities.

355 people registered for WPDI's Conflict Resolution Education courses in 2020.

According to the World Bank, less than eight percent of South Sudan's population uses the Internet on a regular basis. Yet, in the 21st century, Information & Communications Technology skills have become indispensable in professional, cultural, and personal development.

As the world's youngest country, South Sudan has substantial workforce development and digital infrastructure challenges to address. WPDI's Information & Communications Technology course – one of the most popular of all the courses we offer at our network of Community Learning Centers – aims to help trainees develop the skills they need to become both avid users of the Internet as well as competitive modern workers.

409 people enrolled in WPDI's

Information & Communications Technology courses in 2020.

The knowledge and skills that I have gained from WPDI's ICT training helped me open a computer center in Juba that will allow me to generate income for me and my family. I have even been able to employ other youths at the center.

WPDI and our partners know that peacebuilding activities must be paired with economic development, as providing the knowledge and skills necessary to successfully operate a small business is one of the most empowering skills a person can acquire. With South Sudan only having a 60% labor force participation rate, there are hundreds of thousands of youths, women, and men in need of jobs to improve not only their livelihoods, but those of their communities.

139 trainees enrolled in our Business & Entrepreneurship courses in 2020.

The Business & Entrepreneurship course that we offer at our network of Community Learning Centers seeks to help trainees develop the skills necessary to do just that. As such, it is a very popular course at all of our centers, and successfully completing the course is also a prerequisite for entering into our Business Plan Competitions.





The Arts & Crafts course offered at our Community Learning Centers aims to help participants enrich their cultural experiences while harnessing their talents to hone vocational skills. Many former trainees have graduated to start their own small businesses, improving their livelihoods and those of their families.

While our Arts & Crafts courses were not conducted under normal pretenses due to the COVID-19 pandemic, former trainees created thousands of reusable cloth masks, art pieces, and helped raise awareness about the virus and safety measures.









As a popular form of media, cinema can portray values that connect people across ethnic, national, and religious lines, among others. WPDI's Cinema for Peace program aims to serve as a platform for communities to interact, learn about peace-related issues, and share ideas. We do so by screening films that are educational in nature and then conduct focused group discussions afterwards.

2,243 people attended WPDI-held film screenings in 2020.

Under normal pretenses, WPDI holds film screenings at our Community Learning Centers, with events attended by as many as thousands of people at a time. This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we both limited the number of film screenings we conducted as well as capped attendance, in observation of strict safety protocols.

SPURRING ENTREPRENEURSHIP WITH THE BUSINESS BOOTCAMP INITIATIVE



WPDI understands that building successful, long lasting peace in South Sudan rests hand-in-hand with the promotion of sustainable development. That is why we have, in the past year, redoubled our efforts to expand our Business Bootcamp initiative, which supports the creation of small enterprises by young people and other vulnerable citizens.

The Business Bootcamp program serves as an incubation platform that, at its core, aims to promote local entrepreneurship. To ensure that youths and others have the skills necessary to operate a business, we select projects designed by trainees who have successfully completed at least the intermediate level of our Business & Entrepreneurship course. Then the selected projects are developed into small businesses overseen by local committees composed of representatives from WPDI, its partners from the private sector, and other non-governmental organizations, intergovernmental organizations, and local and national stakeholders. The committee's role is to provide our entrepreneurs with both tangible resources, such as grants and/or loans, and intangible resources, such as backstopping support, advice, and specialized training tailored to the needs of the entrepreneurs in question and the specific stage of their businesses' development.





In June, when the Government of South Sudan lifted the country's national lockdown, WPDI and its partners, Gemini Enterprises Africa and the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation, hosted three Business Plan Competitions. Two competitions were held in Juba and the third in Maridi.

The three competitions received a total of **28** business proposal applications from former WPDI trainees. Each was submitted to an expert review committee, and **15** proposals – five from each competition – were ultimately advanced to a review stage that took place later in June. After a close, detailed review of each of the proposals, three winners were announced from each competition: three from our cohort of Youth Peacemakers in Juba and six from former Business & Entrepreneurship course trainees in Juba and Maridi.

Since they won their respective Business Plan Competitions, each business has worked closely with WPDI and its partners to ensure that they have sound business plans and are prepared for operations. We will continue to monitor them to ensure their success and impact.

WPDI currently supports **40** small businesses in the Equatorias region, benefitting 386 youths. All are designed to improve the livelihoods of the youths involved as well as create employment and sustainable development opportunities for their surrounding communities.

This is the heart of our mandate, the value of which is increasingly recognized by our partners and other stakeholders. This will be critical in 2021 as we continue to mobilize more youths and other vulnerable people in the service of building peace and sustainable development in South Sudan.
