This refining of our priorities will allow us to better foster gender equality through our programs in the field as well as our advocacy work at large.

Ten years into our establishment in 2012, such a strategic development captures the lessons we draw from past action and signal our ambition to ceaselessly ensure that our organization can meet the present and emerging challenges faced by conflict-affected and fragile communities.

This is the dynamic that we want to celebrate this anniversary year, which will be crowned by a **Gala-Dinner event that we will hold in September** to shed light on our results and, above all, the many children, youths and women who participate in our programs every day.





# Forest Whitaker receives the International Peace Honors Prize

Last February, our President and Founder, Forest Whitaker, was honored to receive the 2022 International Peace Honors prize presented by PeaceTech Lab for his continued efforts to empower young people across the globe to become peacemakers and agents of change in their communities.

Through WPDI, Forest Whitaker has developed educational programs in Africa and the Americas to provide educational tools and economic opportunities to young men and women in areas marked by exclusion, violence and armed conflict.

The International Peace Honors aims to pay tribute to the work of global leaders in compassion, innovation, and change-making to advance peace, prosperity, and justice around the world, celebrating people who "make philanthropy and humanitarian service a hallmark of their lives, to advance humanity and our planet."

The President and CEO of PeaceTech Lab Sheldon Himelfarb, described Forest Whitaker as "an extraordinary change agent in the peacebuilding field... Transforming communities from within, putting peace at the center of his youth leadership programs — these are inspirational to us all. And we hear his voice — so true and so powerful — on behalf of the voiceless. It's a great honor for us to recognize Forest for all that he has done."

"I have witnessed change in the most unlikely places and have seen communities healing and transforming together," said Forest Whitaker. "Change for the better is possible even in the most difficult times and in the face of the greatest obstacles. I am hopeful and optimistic for the future and will continue to promote education, peace and reconciliation."





### WPDI's Strategic Focus to Empower Women

As fragile communities can regain their resilience capacity only if women are supported and empowered, WPDI's new strategy for the next 10 years will place a stronger focus on promoting women's rights and creating opportunities for them to thrive.

In all the places where WPDI initiated programs with a focus on training and supporting young people, we were nevertheless confronted with the constant fact that conflict and poverty had **disproportionate impacts** not just on marginalized youths but also on **underprivileged women**, who systemically suffered from discriminations and gender-based violence.

These problems were so organic that **our programs naturally developed a strong focus on women's rights and potential, reaching an average of 45% of women among our beneficiaries,** bearing in mind that, in many of the places where we work, women face immense difficulties to carry out activities non related to domestic chores.

In our ten years of operation, from South Africa to South Sudan, we have learned a lot – firstly that, in vulnerable and marginalized places, women, just like youths, have a potential that cannot be ignored if we are to help their communities become more resilient, peaceful, and prosperous. Empowered women are key to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals. Thus, our new strategy for the next ten years focuses on women not just as beneficiaries, but also as assets. We will thrive to provide them with opportunities, opportunities to take part in peace processes; opportunities to create businesses; or opportunities to talk to governments and world leaders.

With women as a priority group, our action for gender equality and women's empowerment will be more focused and more effective.

We are already reaching out to existing and new partners to raise the profile and scope of our programs to promote women's livelihoods or to ensure that schools offer more enabling environments for girls and adolescents. And we are convinced that, by listening even more to their voices, we will, in the years to come, develop new and even more ambitious ideas for programs to help women from underprivileged backgrounds make a difference.





## International Women's Day celebrations

On the 8<sup>th</sup> of March 2022, the world commemorated **International Women's Day.**The day was an opportunity to celebrate the social, cultural, economic, and political achievements of women across the globe.
Celebrating women's achievements in a number of different sectors is essential for increasing visibility, and **creating a more equal**, **less gender-biased world**.

#### SOUTH AFRICA

WPDI South Africa organized an event at the Community Learning Center in Bridgetown, which brought together women from various Cape Flats communities. The theme for the day was "Break the Bias".

Many of the women in attendance work in Cape Flats communities, and are therefore no strangers to the **daily** challenges facing women in the locality.

The day was focused on **celebrating the women for their contribution to society** as well as **acknowledging that we have a long way to go in terms of seeing equality** for women in South Africa.

As a country who faces alarmingly high levels of Gender-Based Violence, the day was also used to **remember those who had lost their lives to violence.** It was an opportunity to bring together a group of dynamic women who are all in some way making a difference in their communities.

#### UGANDA

Our WPDI team at the Kiryandongo Refugee Camp in Uganda organized a Peace Engagement day celebration. This is one of the **core activities in peace building that brings all refugees and host communities together** to share cultural performances, drama presentations, demonstrating peace values and sustainable, peaceful development initiatives. Such events are unifying, and encourage peace building with beneficiaries that come to dance and release stress and mix with other tribes to **strengthen peaceful co-existence amongst themselves and community in general.** 

#### MEXICO

In Tijuana, Mexico, our WPDI program coordinator, Tanya Mota, spoke to 36 women (victims of violence) from the Cerro Colorado community about **prevention of violence**, **the types of violence covered by Mexican law and how it can be prevented.** 

The leader of the community, Blanca Pedraza, introduced WPDI to the attendees.

The women expressed their fear of financial independence and different instances of psychological and physical violence they have suffered or continue to suffer.

Tanya spoke about our CRE training and how peace can be created even in the most vulnerable of situations.



# HQ Field Visit in Uganda and South Sudan

After two years of travel restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic, WPDI's Paris-based Executive Director Caroline Descombris was thrilled to visit our field offices in Uganda and South Sudan again.

She started her journey by visiting the most recent Community Learning Center (CLC), **in the Karamoja Sub-Region, Uganda.** As it was launched during the pandemic, Caroline Descombris never had a chance to visit the place and meet the teams and partners in person.

**There, she celebrated the graduation of 160 trainees** who completed their vocational trainings in Business & Entrepreneurship, Conflict Resolution Education, ICT and Arts & Crafts.

The Executive Director also visited our centers in Gulu, in the Acholi Sub-Region and, and in the Kiryandongo Refugee Settlement.

**She met with many entrepreneurs** who received training and grants from WPDI, and are now backstopped by our experts.

In the Kiryandongo Refugee Settlement, Caroline Descombris attended a graduation ceremony to celebrate the training of 120 women who are now launching their cooperative businesses.

UNHCR and OPM (the Office of the Prime Minister) shared their very positive feedback on our work in the

settlement. A UNHCR representative said, during the graduation ceremony: "Since WPDI arrived in the settlement with peacebuilding programs, I can see a great unity that didn't exist before, especially with all tribes working and playing sports together. It wouldn't have been possible without the peaceful coexistence program and training of WPDI."

Caroline Descombris continued her field visit to South Sudan where she visited **our CLCs in Juba and Torit.** She traveled to **Torit in the Eastern Equatoria State** with our partner the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation, who has supported our programs since 2019 and expanded it in 2022. •










