On September 20, 2022, taking opportunity of the International Day of Peace and the United Nations General Assembly, WPDI will hold a gala Dinner and Auction to celebrate ten years of sparking peace from the grassroots.



## The Whitaker Peace & Development Initiative

Forest Whitaker created WPDI to help young women and men address the challenges of their community in places plagued by endless cycles of armed violence and poverty.

Too often, we view these contexts as sceneries for stories of victims and perpetrators of violence. But Forest had learnt a different story. Throughout his life, he had met with and listened to **youths who had been drawn into violence, sometimes as gang members or child soldiers.** For many, the stories of their lives had started in utter darkness. But, for most of them, this was not the end of their story as they saw it. They had different, luminous narratives in mind. They refused to be the subjects of narratives imposed on them – they wanted to take the lead of change and transform their communities into better places.

The idea behind WPDI was to give them tools and resources to enact new stories of and on their own. Since 2012, with programs in Cameroon, Chad, Gabon, Mexico, South Africa, South Sudan, Uganda and the United States, WPDI has reached more than 1,500,000 people through trainings, computer and learning centers, peace conferences and small businesses. We have helped them drive the narrative of their lives.

However, with over 600 million youth living in conflict- and violence-affected around the world, with so many women there victimized or simply ignored despite their immense potential, **the task ahead is immense. So is our ambition.** By the end of the next decade, our goal is to have reached over 3 million people, contributing to spark a global movement that will help create, in the countless communities trapped in cycles of conflict and fragility, a new narrative — a tale of peace.

## Khadija Mayman

## Youth Peacemaker and Conflict Resolution Education trainer in Cape Flats, South Africa

Khadija Mayman joined WPDI in 2019 when she was 23 years old. She started as a Youth Peacemaker, and in 2021 she joined the staff team as a Conflict Resolution trainer.

Khadija comes from Bonteheuwel, one of the most violent communities in the Cape Flats. After being exposed to so much violence on a daily basis as a young girl, she developed a strong desire to bring change to her community. Joining WPDI has been a life-changing experience. We have witnessed her transformation, especially when she went through our peacebuilding training.

My journey with WPDI started in 2019. I had been unemployed for 3 months when I found out about this amazing opportunity for young people who wanted to bring change in their communities. After reading about the Trainer of Trainees (ToT) opportunity, I did some research about the work that WPDI does and I was immediately intrigued. I've always been passionate about uplifting my community. At the time I was volunteering with a couple of community organizations and that experience only enhanced the love I had for my community and wanting to make it a better place. The opportunity to become a Trainer of Trainees came at the best time.

My experience as a ToT in training was empowering. I learnt how to be a better leader, I was encouraged to be more confident in my capabilities, to be firm in my opinions



and beliefs as a woman, I improved on my public speaking skills and most importantly I became part of a team that acknowledged and supported my growth. Through the guidance and teachings of my trainers and fellow ToTs I saw myself become a better version of myself. As much as I was here to improve my community, I experienced so much personal growth that made me better equipped to serve not only my community, but my family and the greater society.

In December of 2020, I graduated as a Trainer of Trainees and this is where the real work started. I started training in schools and training local youth in 2021. My experience as a trainer was not always easy, especially with the challenges of the CO-VID-19 pandemic. However, with the support of the staff team and managers, we were able to overcome the challenges and the highlight was witnessing the local youth graduating last year. It was a reminder of why I joined WPDI and why the work that the organization does is so important. Seeing the impact that the training had on my group of local youth made me proud to have been able to train them.

In September of 2021, I was employed by WPDI as a Conflict Resolution Trainer and it has been one of my greatest achievements. I am grateful that I get to work in a space that allows me to learn, grow and strengthen my ability to be an effective trainer. I'm able to learn from the rest of the team every day. But I also get to positively contribute to my community through my trainings. I know that this is only the beginning of my journey at WPDI but I am proud of the progress I've made since starting the journey in 2019. I look forward to reaching many more great achievements at WPDI and continue to make a positive impact in the lives of others. Becoming a part of the WPDI family has really been a life changing experience for myself and so many others.

## Emad Rajab Said

## Youth Peacemaker in the Kiryandongo Refugee Settlement, Uganda

Rajab was born in the Nuba Mountains in Sudan. Son of a rebel soldier, he was sent to South Sudan to get an education when he was seven. He had to follow a group of people he didn't know, without anyone to take care of him. Living in the bush, he faced many challenges such as hunger, disease, lack of clothing and resources. When war broke out again in South Sudan, the people he was living with fled the country and he found himself completely alone and hungry. After three days of wandering, he found a group of South Sudanese running away to Uganda because of the tribal conflicts that forced thousands of people to flee for their lives.

He found shelter in the Kiryandongo Refugee Settlement, where he joined WPDI at the age of 20. Since then, he has become one of our best Youth Peacemakers, training pupils and community members in peacebuilding, conducting mediations to resolve conflicts within the settlement, and even taking the lead of a major campaign to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. As a peacebuilder, Rajab is now also part of national discussions to protect children affected by armed conflicts in Uganda.

My name is Emad Rajab Said, a Sudanese living in the Kiryandongo Refugee Settlement, Uganda. I came to the refugee settlement in Uganda when I was 16 years old. It was not easy for a kid like me to survive in a refugee camp without his family



members around. Everything was hard but I was lucky to go to school and complete secondary education. In the settlement, there were too many tribal conflicts which resulted in brutal fights that caused death. I was alone and I was always scared for my life because I didn't have someone to protect me. Some refugees mocked me because I lived in a very poor house alone, they even accused me of theft. Sometimes they even called the cluster leader to throw me out, but fortunately he didn't.

WPDI arrived in the settlement in 2017. When I heard about the program they had for the youth, I loved it and I promised myself to give all my best to become a peace ambassador. I joined the program in 2017 and I became a certified Trainer of Trainees and youth peace ambassador in the community. Since I became a youth peace advocate, my life has never been the same again. I have always dreamt of spreading peace to my community so that we can have a peaceful community. Today I train and teach peace in schools, in the community and even in the media. I feel confident whenever addressing people locally or in international forums. I learnt how to care for others and help every person without discrimination. I also learnt different cultures while working with the different communities.

WPDI gave me the opportunity to get exposure and participate in high-level summits and discussion of internal matters. I also keep working to bring positive change in my community. I hope one day I will go back to Sudan and help my own community in the Nuba Mountains. They are so much in need of these services and I feel that I need to help my people to come out of the darkness of all types of violence. I am so happy that I got an opportunity to learn and practice what I have learnt from the WPDI program. I am very sure that everyone who got the same opportunity would be very grateful, the way I am today.
